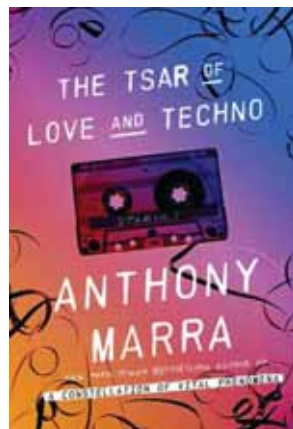

***Sacred Ground: The Chicago Streets of Timuel Black* by Timuel D. Black, Jr.**

Wednesday, Nov. 20, 11:00

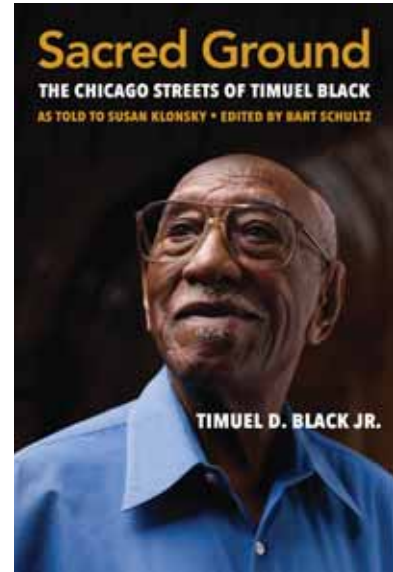
Black recounts in vivid detail his childhood and education in the Black Metropolis of Bronzeville and South Side neighborhoods that make up his "sacred ground." Centenarian Timuel Black has been a life-long activist for social justice and this book is a testimony of his life and times. Black will be speaking at the Library on Nov. 16; learn more on p. 5.

Activist and Historian Timuel D. Black, Jr. in Conversation

Saturday, Nov. 16, 2:00

Don't miss this opportunity to hear legendary 100-year-old civil rights activist and historian Timuel Black discuss his new book, *Sacred Ground: The Chicago Streets of Timuel Black*. *Sacred Ground* opens in 1919, during the summer of the Chicago race riot, when infant Black and his family arrive in Chicago from Birmingham, Alabama, as part of the first Great Migration. He recounts in vivid detail his childhood and education in the Black Metropolis of Bronzeville and South Side neighborhoods that make up his "sacred ground." A labor organizer, educator, and activist, Black captures fascinating anecdotes and vignettes of meeting with famous figures of the times, such as Duke Ellington and Martin Luther King Jr., but also with unheralded people whose lives convey lessons about striving, uplift, and personal integrity.



Bart Schultz, editor of the book, will talk with Black about his life and the stories recounted in the book. Copies of the book will be available for purchase from The Book Stall.

Timuel D. Black, Jr. has spent his life furthering the cause of social justice, and his two volumes of oral histories, *Bridges of Memory: Chicago's First Wave of Black Migration* and *Bridges of Memory: Chicago's Second Generation of Black Migration*, published by Northwestern University Press, chronicle black Chicago history from the 1920s to the present. Bart Schultz is a senior lecturer in humanities and director of the Civic Knowledge Project at the University of Chicago. He is the author of many works, including *Henry Sidgwick: Eye of the Universe*.

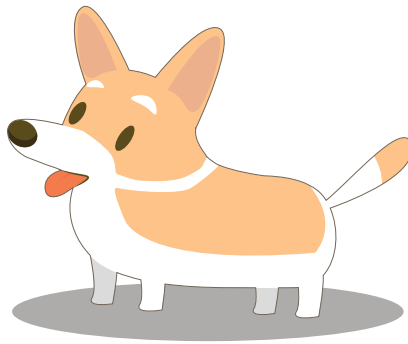

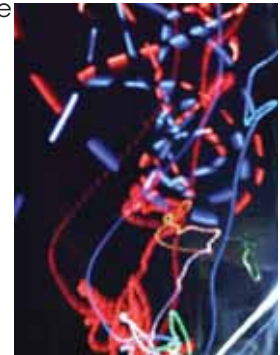
