Library Activities for November-December 2025 - January 2026

Welcome Desk & Shelving (Manager Patsy deVuono)

Monthly Statistics

The library saw 21,577 visitors in November, and 22,013 in December, averaging 739 unique users each day.

The AMH cleared 53,163 items in November, with 20,834 going to the exceptions cart. In December the AMH count was 54,584 items cleared, with 21,356 items going to Circulation for more attention. The beginning of the week is the busiest with a steady slowdown at the end of the week and weekend. The early morning is the busiest time of day with 27,794 items checked in between 8AM and 9AM in both months. By contrast only 1,355 items were checked in between 8PM and 9PM.

The daily ILL bin count was 219 in November, and 238 bins in December.

We charged 309 Wonderbooks and Vox Books in November, and 322 in December. In November we sent 228 items for repair. In December there were only 147 items. The amount of discs we clean is going down: in November we cleaned 21, in December 13.

The Welcome Desk saw 1,031 interactions in November, and 932 in December. In November, they answered 417 reference questions; 270 face to face and 147 over the phone. In December there were 332 total Reference questions; 190 in person and 142 over the phone.

There were 427 directional questions in November; 405 in person and only 22 on the phone. In December there were 469 total directional questions; 396 face to face and 63 over the phone. There were 187 direct phone transfers in November, and 141 in December. As always Friday evenings are the slowest time at the desk, averaging only 6 interactions after 7pm.

Progress on Goals

The media room Playaways were shifted from under the north windows to the open shelving with the rest of the audiobook collection. Aarin was able to remove the old wooden shelving from this area giving us a lot more room in the area.

The DVDs were also consolidated, after we helped Adult Services remove more items to be weeded. The boxed set CDs were shifted to the west wall shelving that was installed at the end of the CD collection. Aarin switched out the drawers to regular shelving.

Staff continued shifting in the media room in support of the Collection Revitalization Project. The open audiobook shelving unit and open DVD shelving units were relocated to the lower level North Room. We've begun planning the future layout of that room and can better visualize the space and flow of the collections with these open units installed there.



Shelvers also helped pull books in the 900s area and in Large Type for review.

The Mystery and Suspense books have been read and straightened; the area is very tight and needs weeding.

In Youth Services, shelvers helped with shifting. Holiday Items, seasonal books, Reading Rally materials, and all of the audiovisual collections were shifted to provide improved access and flow to the collections. Youth staff are also shifting display fixtures, seating, and study tables.

Physical Collections / Technical Services (Assistant Manager Shanti D'Costa)

In November, cataloging librarian Carly Stauss input 65 Wilmette Reads books and updated all catalog documentation related to the series, while process assistant Emma Standard processed the materials books by placing two Wilmette Reads stickers, three pieces of Vistatape for reinforcement, and green overlay on each book in addition to the normal processing procedure.

Due to the temporary closure of the Wilmette Post Office, mail is being delivered in the afternoon instead of in the morning, which shifted a number of routines and procedures related to all mail (including magazines and newspapers), and required more time tracking when each periodical is delivered to ensure we do not miss any issues while the post office continues to adjust to their temporary procedures and location.

The TS team continued its acquisitions, cataloging, and preparation of new library of things items for circulation to our patrons. New additions to the collection include: crochet hook set, circular knitting needle set, 2 new GoPro HERO13 cameras, and 3 puzzles.

Assistant Manager Shanti D’Costa continued to coordinate alternative means of order fulfillment in the wake of our primary material vendor Baker & Taylor closing its operations. In December, she worked on compiling a list of all grids for Youth and Adult books for Libraria, and finalized a number of details with our representatives on their team. Shanti also ran this list through the paces with “test titles” to make sure that our imported MARC records, specifically our 970 field in the bib records were configured correctly.

All backorders from June through December 2025 were returned to selectors for their evaluation/confirmation. The librarian team identified the orders that they would like to keep active and the ones that can be cancelled for now.


Digital Collections (Digital & Maker Services Manager Lauren Kelly)

Updates

- In November, Lydia Hanchett identified and provided cost-per-circulation access to just over 100 “zombie” hold titles that had no corresponding license copies within our consortium.
- Lydia also corresponded with representatives from the Wall Street Journal and Washington Post to explore adding those online resources to our collection.
- The in-library flyers promoting our online resources were a bit stale and had some outdated information. Lydia began the process of updating these flyers.

Digital Collections Highlights

- Consumer Reports had a strong month of usage in November, coinciding with Black Friday and holiday gift shopping.
- Ancestry and Heritage Quest genealogy resources both saw usage spikes in November, ahead of seasonal family gatherings for many.
- Patrons watched 1,145 movies and TV shows on Kanopy in December.
- November and December were busy months for digital newspaper access. PressReader and Newspaper Archive saw exceptionally high usage; the New York Times was the most-accessed title on both platforms. Use of our New York Times website access continued to be exceedingly strong, with 11,443 usage sessions across both months. We launched two new Chicago Tribune platforms in October, and in December we reached 100 combined monthly users for the first time.

Circulation (Manager Matthew Hoffman)

We welcomed 140 new cardholders in November, and 109 new cardholders in December.

We welcomed 10 new D39 student cardholders in November.

In November, Assistant Manager Mark Cegielski completed the final steps in our bi-annual National Change of Address (NCOA) database cleanup project.

ILL Coordinator Amy Jung and Matthew submitted the annual Illinet survey. We also completed our quarterly RAILS count the week of November 17-21.

Matthew worked with CCS to establish a group block for new and older videogames on the checkout stations. The maximum number that a patron can check out is 5 total.

With the timing of the holidays, December was a relatively quiet month in terms of physical material checkouts, with our monthly circulation stats dropping under 47,000. There was, however, a slight uptick in check-ins, with about 2,000 more than the previous month.

December began with the resolution of an ongoing issue with our outside lockers. At the end of November, Bibliotheca replaced the touchscreen computer in the unit. However, this computer's new IP address was not linking-up correctly with our Smart Locker software. With the assistance of our IT department (Christine Hightower) and our technician from Bibliotheca, we were able to resolve this issue.

The Collection Revitalization team has finalized plans to relocate the holds shelves back to the Circulation lobby to provide greater convenience and staff support to this popular service. The holds shelves (which formerly occupied 10 shelves in the space where we currently display our new DVD and Blu-ray media by the Circulation Desk), were relocated to the above shelves in the Adult Services Recent Arrivals area in the early stages of the pandemic in 2020, and quickly grew to occupy over 30 shelves, which has been sustained ever since. As part of our Collection Revitalization Project, staff are implementing a series of improvements to spaces around the first and lower level in response to patron demand for resources. We anticipate the installation of the holds shelving will take place in late February, with additional phases of improvements to follow this spring.

Adult and Teen Services (Manager Cathleen Blair)

Progress on Goals


Develop and present valuable, outcome-oriented programs and events.

Wilmette Reads: In November and December, significant energies were invested in final preparations and launch of the third annual Wilmette Reads community reading initiative for adults and teens. Assistant Manager Rachel Garcia and Librarian Rachel Rothe worked with Communications and Events partners to create preview spotlights, design the activity guide, and prepare public displays to spark engagement in this year's spotlight on the appeal of reinventing familiar stories with a contemporary lens. Leaning into the cultural moment of titles such as *James* by Percival Everett, *Demon Copperhead* by Barbara Kingsolver, and the two-part film adaptation of *Wicked*, we are introducing *This Motherless Land* by Nikki May, a cross-cultural reimagining of Jane Austen's *Mansfield Park*, as a featured selection for conversation while at the same time broadening the scope to celebrate the wealth of retellings for any reader interest.

In the short weeks following the launch on December 15, we can report a strong start in terms of sign-ups. In December alone, we fielded 120 specific patron interactions and 110 confirmed enrollments, and there is demonstrable patron enthusiasm for both the spotlighted title and the larger exploration of retellings. One patron commented that *This Motherless Land* was "a great pick... It's SO good." Department staff have also heard from multiple patrons how easy it is to sign up and to finish the program, which we are confident will manifest in a high number of successful completions this year.

In service to the enthusiastic response of our "Level Up" title suggestion bookmarks from Summer Reading 2025, Rachel Rothe curated titles for eight categories of retellings to be readily available for patron self-service or for staff assistance. In an effort to connect with additional audience and boost discovery, Senior Services Librarian Jillian McKeown expanded the Wilmette Reads theme to encompass visual media retellings for display.





Silent Book Club: In November, the library hosted its first Silent Book Club, a relatively recent iteration of reader gathering, at Central Station in Wilmette. In service to those who want to balance the private experience of reading with the social connections of those who have similar interests, patrons came together first to introduce themselves and then to enjoy companionable reading in quiet proximity. Senior Services Librarian Jillian McKeown then brought the attendees together to reflect on the experience and to share what each was reading. Everyone expressed joy regarding “a very fun experience” as well as a hope that the library might host another opportunity in future.

KPop Demon Hunters Party: Teen Services Librarian Krista Hutley collaborated with Youth Services Librarians Eti Berland and Jennifer Lee to offer a joint tween/teen fandom event in November to honor the enthusiasm for the film *KPop Demon Hunters*. More than twenty attended to celebrate this pop culture phenomenon: singing karaoke, posing in the photobooth, coloring images from the show, enjoying bookmark and sticker giveaways, and creating themed projects such as LED lightsticks and painted fans.



Honoring Veterans Day: Genealogy and Local History Librarian EvaAnne Johnson partnered with North Suburban Genealogical Society to host November program “Honoring Veterans Day: Members Sharing Their Ancestors’ Military Stories”, a collaborative program inviting participants to contribute narrative about a veteran in their family tree. Nine community members spoke about military stories, ranging from the Civil War to the Vietnam War. One presenter spoke about his own memory of a tense military drill onboard the USS Collett during the Vietnam War, another about his father-in-law's experience surviving the Bataan Death March, and another about her father’s involvement with the Manhattan Project. A love story between an Army nurse and a soldier, a father’s story as a radio operator and driver during WWII, as well as an uncle’s WWII story of survival after his ship was bombed were also shared. Attendees were enthusiastic about the unique format and the opportunity to hear each other’s stories.

Book Discussions: Assistant Manager Rachel Garcia and Librarian Rachel Rothe co-led two book discussions, one with a small but passionate group exploring *Persuasion* by Jane Austen in celebration of Austen’s 250th birthday, and the other with the regular Classics and Contemporary gathering. In the latter, participants read Diane Wilson’s *The Seed Keeper*, a book that impressed most of the group. One attendee confessed they first engaged with expectation they would not enjoy but had been pleasantly surprised with the approach that the author took with the subject matter, illustrating the value of librarian-curated selections and facilitated discussions.

Explore and facilitate opportunities to grow and strengthen strategic partnerships.



Alzheimer’s Association: Senior Services Librarian Jillian McKeown partners with the Alzheimer’s Association in sponsoring a monthly virtual Dementia Caregiver Support Group, and her role includes most of the administrative and communication tasks. The group dialogue is facilitated to support participants sharing challenges in caregiving and to offer support from those in similar circumstances, all within the context of a confidential forum.

Wilmette-Kenilworth Chamber of Commerce: Business Librarian John Amundsen reported a successful final installment of the 2025 Coffee and Business Connections networking series, events co-sponsored by the Wilmette-Kenilworth Chamber of Commerce. The series has continually gained attendance and awareness in the business community, leading to increased requests for mentoring referrals and 1:1 business research appointments, and exciting plans are in development for continuation in 2026.

Women of Wilmette: Following a 2024 success, Assistant Manager Rachel Garcia, Librarian Rachel Rothe, and practicum student Melissa W. were invited for a 2025 encore presentation opportunity with the Women of Wilmette. Introducing “Best Books of 2025”, they showcased a range of titles for different reading tastes, enhanced with both slide show and handout for personal TBRs and gift lists. Individuals have since visited the library in person to reiterate their appreciation at having the ‘inside scoop’ into the library world and with the engaging style of presentation, and the WCW group is sourcing monthly book discussion titles from the highlighted releases.



Pink Couch Books: In November, Teen Services Librarian Krista Hutley partnered with Lora Amigo, owner of romance bookstore Pink Couch Books in Wilmette, to offer a Book Bedazzling program for grades 7-12 held onsite at the store. Nine teens participated in this popular trend, using glue and tiny colorful gems to bedazzle a book cover.



Highlight the wealth of resources offered in our building and collections in more accessible and visually appealing ways

In addition to curated retellings displays to support the community reading initiative, Librarian Rachel Rothe designed a variety of other materials spotlights to engage visitors. A few examples include Native American History Month, Sweet Home Chicago, History Reimagined, and a special “For Fans of *Stranger Things*” to correspond with the anticipated drop of the final season of the popular series.



In media, “Noirvember”, a November celebration of classic film noir, was by far one of the most popular movie displays featured in the public area, requiring regular replenishment and eventually additional creativity as core titles were claimed. One patron approached Senior Services Librarian Jillian McKeown, not realizing she was responsible for the spotlight, and volunteered how much she loved and was inspired by the theme.

Prepare staff with professional development resources and leadership opportunities and support individual paths for career growth.

Librarian Rachel Rothe attended a meeting of the Adult Reading Round Table Steering Committee as a potential new member and was later invited to join the committee. Among her contributions during the first year of office will be participating in and planning upcoming genre study and book club development programs, as well as helping to design 2026 ARRTCon, a day of professional advisory skill development opportunities.

Assistant Manager Rachel Garcia concluded her semester supervision of practicum student Melissa W. after guiding her through nearly forty hours of direct experience with Wilmette Public Library. Melissa gained experience in creating displays, blog posts, and book lists, as well as in book discussion facilitation, outreach, and preparation for a community-wide reading initiative. Through her work, Melissa demonstrated thoughtful decision-making, clearly shared the library’s interest in bringing interesting and diverse perspectives to the community, and exuded enthusiasm for libraries and the work that they do. Rachel’s leadership in goal-setting, task structuring, facilitating interdepartmental experiences, mentoring, establishing benchmarks, and evaluation were key to Melissa’s success.

Business Librarian John Amundsen has been appointed to the Village of Skokie Fine Arts Commission by Mayor Ann Tennes and the Board of Trustees, in a term that will extend through August 2027. The Fine Arts Commission oversees several performing and fine arts grants, public art projects throughout the village, and several arts centers throughout the Village of Skokie.

Additional Insights

Public Desk Service

Adult Services staff answered nearly 5000 discrete questions in November and December combined. Thirty-eight percent related to library collection assistance, successfully illustrating the skill and advocacy of staff in amplifying and connecting patrons to books and media curated for use. Twenty-nine percent of interactions were in service to study room inquiries, reflecting gains over even usual high usage due to student preparation for semester exams. This period saw sharp increases in formal appointments with reference librarians, most notably in the categories of genealogy and in learning how to access digital resources on newly gifted devices.

Genealogy and Local History Services

The surge in genealogy and local history appointment requests in the final months of the year included the return of experienced researchers and the introduction of several first-time genealogy and property researchers. One applied for a scan of a handwritten early history of the Boy Scouts in Wilmette, which will also soon be made available in the library's Local History Digital Collection. Genealogy and Local History Librarian EvaAnne Johnson reports that each appointment reveals a new and interesting story about local individuals and places, and it brings her joy to learn about them even as she is offering her expert guidance.

Collection and Advisory Services

Not everyone realizes that specialist librarians are eager to provide reading suggestions, especially when it can be difficult to identify a topic or theme not as widely represented. Whether an in-person request at the desk or a webform submission for a personalized, curated booklist, AS librarians invest both attentive analysis of what the reader seeks and deep knowledge of collection to offer a creative array of possibilities.

- A patron requested a list of books featuring trans male protagonists, adding that they were just getting back into reading and wanted to read books that celebrated queer identities. Assistant Manager Rachel Garcia compiled a robust list of options, and the patron left with “a giant stack of books and a huge smile on their face.” Rachel adds, “It made me very proud that we curate such an amazing and diverse collection. I’m so happy that patron had a positive experience at the library after being away for so long.”
- Librarians Rachel Garcia and Rachel Rothe each received correspondence from patrons who had previously taken advantage of the Book Picks webform request:
 - Hi Rachel [G]. Just wanted to let you know that so far I've read *Ministry of Time* and *The Heart's Invisible Furies* -- and loved both! Thanks again for the great recommendations, and I’m looking forward to getting to more on this list. ~ S.

- Rachel [R]! Your picks kept me sustained throughout the year. Not only did I buy *Abigail* for a friend going through a tough time earlier this year AND for my grandfather for Christmas... I truly loved *A Place for Us*. I would have never found it myself. And I just finished Iza's *Ballad*. All because last year's adult winter reading challenge I did alongside my kids suggested I use this service. I may just have to use it again with a few new books I read this year (and wasn't expecting to love as much as I did) as the basis for the recommendations. ~ M.

Teen Services

After comprehensive assessment and great advocacy, Teen Services Librarian Krista Hutley and School Engagement Librarian Eti Berland successfully implemented planned revisions to the teen volunteer program. The Library's dedicated Volunteer webpage (<https://www.wilmettelibrary.info/about-us/volunteering>) has been updated for clarity and ease of use for teens and families. New tools to support coordination of volunteer scheduling and communication have been piloted, already demonstrating value in early usage.

December can be a notably high-activity month in teen services, and Krista planned a number of offerings to connect with students: a seasonal Teen Take & Make project, a *Wicked: For Good* movie release party, the highly successful Teen Pizza Study Night, and a Dungeons & Dragons campaign. Moreover, she partnered with Digital and Maker Services Associate Ethan Hendricks to sponsor a Smash Bros. Ultimate Nintendo Switch tournament for twenty-five excited competitors (grades 3-8) and a total of 45 people in attendance, with heavy representation of those who aren't often eager to engage in library programming.

Youth Services (Manager Andrea Vaughn Johnson)

Youth Services Programs: November 2025

In November, Youth Services offered 46 scheduled events with a total attendance of 1,660 patrons. We also facilitated 16 drop-in activities like StoryWalks, open play times, and in-house activities which drew about 1300 participants. Here are a few highlights from November's youth and family programming:

Kindness Rocks! Rock Painting

In the *Kindness Rocks!* program on Saturday, November 8, fifteen patrons in grades 4-8 painted rocks with inspirational messages to be placed around their neighborhoods. Parents expressed gratitude for a program that aligns with the values they want to promote.

Bluey Party

Recognizing the power of early literacy media and children's fandoms, Youth Services Librarian Amanda Jacover spearheaded a highly anticipated Bluey Party (which included two sessions!) on Wednesday, November 26. The programs included a variety of interactive stations from puppet-making, coloring and activity pages, a character scavenger hunt, imaginative play baking, and a reading corner. We provided "extra magic" by revealing a surprise guest – Bluey herself, who led a dance party, followed by a photo opportunity where everyone could have their picture taken with Bluey. Amanda leveraged her connection with regular patron, Vasthy Valmont, who runs KID'z Mascot Fiesta, a small business serving the Chicago community, who provides character entertainment experiences, to invite her to be our special guest, Bluey. Our community was overjoyed to spend time with Bluey.



This program was thoughtfully designed to ensure everyone had a good experience, including additional activities in the Youth Program Room for people who could not get into either of the full programs. Youth Services staff including Lisa Bigelow, Sarah Jo Zaharako, Jennifer Lee, and Eti Berland helped prepare for and staff the event. Our Youth Helper Audrey provided much appreciated assistance in managing the different stations and the crowds. Youth Services Assistant Manager Lisa Bigelow worked closely with Amanda to design the program plan and room set-up that created an efficient system to ensure everyone got their picture with Bluey. IT Assistant Christine Hightower made sure that all the technology ran smoothly and successfully, troubleshooting during the program to keep the party going. More than 200 people enjoyed the Bluey Party experience and the additional activities in the YPR.

Amanda Jacover shared how supported she felt by the whole library: “From YS, Welcome Desk, Safety and Facilities, IT, and more, everyone went above and beyond to make our Bluey Party successful and unforgettable.” Patrons shared many compliments about their positive experiences. A patron who noticed the extra Bluey activities in the YPR: “I’m not surprised you all thought of doing that. You are SO organized.”



One of our regular caregivers shared: “The Bluey event was wonderful. Your team always does a wonderful job. Taylor Swift has nothing on Bluey!” It was truly “library joy” at its best.

Minecraft Craft World

Inspired by the fandom around Minecraft - and the high interest of Ethan's Minecraft Club, YS Librarian Jennifer Lee created a Minecraft Craft World program to respond to kids' interests. She provided a variety of fun activities including a scavenger hunt, photo booth, and crafting torches, bookmarks, and a Creeper Toss game. Kids were the experts in the room about the world of Minecraft, sharing why they love it so much, explaining to us, the grown-ups, how it works - and meeting likeminded friends in the process. Truly, following what kids are curious about is one of the best ways to build community - and Jennifer always seeks to build her programs with that curiosity and kid-appeal at the heart of her work.

One mom commented about the program a week after. Her kid wasn't so sure about attending the program but ended up joining the whole time and had a great time, and she said her son asked us to host this program again.

Youth Services staff also prepared 15 teacher bags for pickup at the Welcome Desk in November.

Kindergarten Visit

Youth Services completed its fall kindergarten field trip program in November. Throughout the fall, we hosted Kindergarten visits, which create a strong foundation for school-library partnerships. Relaunched in fall 2024 after a five-year hiatus, kindergarten visits have become an essential part of our school engagement program. This year, we hosted visits with Romona, McKenzie, Central, Joseph Sears, Central, and Harper Schools. We hosted Central School's Kindergarten classes for the first time this year, ensuring that we have now hosted all District 39 Kindergartens.

On November 10, we hosted all of Joseph Sears School's kindergartens. On November 17, we hosted all of Harper School's kindergartens.





These field trips are made possible because of the hard work of our local kindergarten teachers, classroom parents, chaperones, and administrators who manage the logistics and support enrichment experiences in our community. (Harper School even made a book sharing what they love about the library that we shared with all staff.) It's also a team effort here at the library to ensure field trips run smoothly. Facilities and Safety manage bus parking and room setups, youth services staff present storytime and lead tours, and Circulation staff offer insights about how books get to the library, showcasing the blue bins that come in daily. We're grateful for everyone's help to make our kindergarten visits successful. These early positive experiences help children become lifelong library users.

Youth Services Programs: December 2025

In December, Youth Services offered 36 scheduled events with a total attendance of 1,071 patrons. We also facilitated 21 drop-in activities like StoryWalks, open play times, and in-house activities which drew about 1,300 participants. Here are a few highlights from December's youth and family programming:

Winter Reading Club is Here!

Winter Reading Club kicked off on December 15, just in time for the winter break. Children of all ages, even pre-readers, can join. Kids simply check off 20 spaces on a reading log and bring it to the Youth Services desk to report. After telling our librarians about their reading and winter activities, they can pick a book from our prize cart. Winter Reading Club book prizes are funded by the Friends of the Wilmette Public Library.



Supporting Autistic Children at Home: A Let's Learn Together Parent Educator Program

Thanks to the generosity of our presenters from [Easterseals](#), our recent program Supporting Autistic Children at Home went strong until closing time on Tuesday, December 2. Following a resource-packed presentation and Q&A, caregivers of children and emerging adults connected with one another and our presenters to exchange information, ask questions, and build community. This program was developed in partnership with District 39's Parent Association of Student Services.



STEAM Lab

In December, Jennifer Lee hosted STEAM Lab featuring a Melt-Free Olaf activity and a Scrape Painting program for kindergarten through 2nd graders. Both sessions brought over 20 children in each program. Kids enthusiastically explored hands-on art and science activities that encouraged creativity, curiosity, and joyful learning.

Winter Reading Club Promotions

Joseph Sears School Family Literacy Night

School Engagement Librarian Eti Berland attended Joseph Sears School's Family Literacy Night and book fair launch on December 3 as a special guest by Joseph Sears School Parents' Volunteer Association (JSSPVA) and school administration to share interactive read-alouds and library resources. This was the first time the library participated in Sears' family literacy night.

Harper Winter Reading Club Visit

Eti Berland visited Harper Elementary School on December 10 to share an interactive presentation about Winter Reading Club, engaging students about their reasons for reading in the winter, sharing an interactive game to spotlight the variety of formats and reading experiences, spotlighting library programs that would appeal to them, and book-talking high-interest books to encourage children to select books before they go on break. Many students opted to join her presentation during their regular recess and enthusiastically participated.



Central Book Fair

Eti Berland and Digital & Maker Services Librarian Janet Piehl were invited to attend Central School's PTA Book Fair on December 10 for storytime and crafts, library resources, and Winter Reading Club promotions. Janet provided an original Minty & Marshmallow sticker coloring activity for families, many of whom shared that they were regular visitors to the Studio and were excited to visit during winter break and attend the Secret Gift Workshop. She also shared Studio resources, sample projects, and answered many questions about visiting the Studio.



Central School Winter Reading Club Visit

Programs

Digital & Maker Services Librarian Janet Piehl ran the **Maker Garden** in November and December. November continued with the theme of “Block Party,” which quieted down after the snowfall. Janet then worked to winterize the Maker Garden, installing the annual Solstice Log, a fake yule log display, reminiscent of the log burning in the fireplace on TV.



Program Highlights

- In November, Digital & Maker Services Associate Ethan Herdrich ran Design a 3D Printed Snowman, with 6 patrons attended. The kids had varying levels of computer literacy, for some of them it was the first time using a mouse. Other kids were familiar enough with Tinkercad to follow the instruction sheet on their own. Everyone left having completed a snowman.
- This month Digital & Maker Services Assistant Manager Lydia Hanchett ran our first sewing program – Learn to Sew: Fleece Hats. She led two sessions of beginner sewing machine classes in which participants made their own fleece winter hats to take home. The first session, on Tuesday evening, had 4 patrons and the second session, on Wednesday morning, had our maximum of 5. All were enthusiastic learners, and everybody left with a hat that they made!

One patron emailed to say “Thank you so much for teaching our group to sew a fleece hat. It was such an enjoyable learning event! Your preparation was perfect; and your demonstrations and explanations were clear. Thank you for teaching this wonderful event. I love my new hat, perfect for a cold Wilmette winter!”



- Janet worked with YS Librarian Diane Dos Santos on the annual Secret Gift Workshop in December, with 35 total attendees. The kids turned out with focus and creativity! The mom of two regular attendees emailed us: "...thank you for hosting this wonderful event once again. Tate and Melrose had an absolute blast on Saturday, as did their friends—several of whom had never attended before and just loved it. Thank you for creating such a unique and creative opportunity that truly empowers kids to give meaningful gifts to their loved ones."



- In December Ethan and Teen Librarian Krista Hutley ran the Smash Bros Ultimate Nintendo Switch tournament. 25 registered participants competed in the tournament, but at least 50 people attended the event including siblings and parents. Every kid that participated got to play in at least two matches. It was a lively event that benefitted from having two teen volunteers that helped check everyone in and fill out the bracket. The final match was the closest match of the entire tournament. All in all a very successful program!



- Digital Services Assistant Alex Barzallo hosted Cutting the Cable cord (virtual) in November with 13 attendees. Patrons who attended were involved throughout the presentation. Though this program is usually well attended, Alex may reassess how often he runs it. The idea behind the program was to show patrons alternatives to traditional cable while possibly saving money. However, with streaming platforms steadily raising their prices, the potential savings are becoming harder to guarantee.

Program Updates

The DMS Team has started to plan running our submitted programs for the January / February / March cycle, and will meet in early January to discuss April / May programs. As always, we offer a mix of Maker, Digital Literacy, Online Resources, Gaming, and Coding programs for all ages.

The Studio

In November, the Studio team had 600 interactions in the space, and December saw 339. This drop is due to our annual holiday closure.

Studio Projects and Patron Stories

The Studio was very busy over the schools' Thanksgiving break. We had some help from our teen volunteers during these busy times, which was great. Projects during that time included:

- A group of young teens made layered adhesive vinyl gnomes for their water bottles. They were very excited about gnomes.
- Some tweens made "Wimpy Kid Club" buttons.
- A family that had just moved here from Singapore stopped by and were excited to see what their new American library has to offer!
- A staff member came in with her kids to convert her son's drawing of a monster into a heat transfer to press onto t-shirts and sweatshirts for gifts. What a cool drawing! The design came out really well.



We also had other projects, including many for the holidays.

- A brother and sister came into the Studio to make Christmas magnets to gift each other. They used separate computers so they wouldn't see the other's designs; it was very cute.
- Annie helped a patron print return labels for her holiday cards. We had to work around the snowflake design so there was some trial and error but eventually we were able to make it look nice. She said she's had the labels for years but hasn't used them because she doesn't have a printer at home. She was very grateful to finally use them with the library's help!


- Ethan Herdrich had a rewarding experience with a young patron who was interested in 3D printing. The patron saw an active print going on a machine- a head of a character from the video game Hollow Knight, which Ethan explained. The patron came back a couple weeks later to submit a 3D print and remembered the conversation, which lead to the kid submitting his own 3D print, an Ender Dragon from Minecraft.
- A tween made a “coupon book” to give as a gift for her mom’s birthday.
- A patron embroidered a couch cushion with her granddaughter’s name as a Christmas gift. This is likely the largest embroidery project we’ve done!



Studio Updates

- The newly implemented system for embroidery machine certifications is going well. There is less strain on staff and patrons are knowledgeable about and empowered in completing their projects. As of the end of December we have certified 29 individuals to use the machine.
- Janet Piehl accompanied School Engagement Librarian Eti Berland to Central School’s Book Fair event on Wednesday evening 12/10. They had two separate tables in two different rooms—Eti’s focused on Winter Reading Club and services to youth in general and Janet’s focused on the Studio. She made black-and-white Minty and Marshmallow stickers for the kids to color and was pleased to see that most of the families that attended stopped by the table, and many of them told her how much they like the library. Many had already been to the Studio and the kids recognized library mascots Minty and Marshmallow. Their parents didn’t, which made for some funny interactions! Eti reported 476 people in attendance.

- Janet Piehl planned a Winter Reading Club Studio craft for kids, a library card/bookmark pocket with a “Library Joy” theme.
- Finn Dos Santos performed upkeep maintenance of one of our 3D printers, including dusting the extruder fans and relubricating the moving parts.
- Janet Piehl and Annie Blackie created the November-December display in the Studio.

Technology Desk + DMS Department

- In November DMS Staff had 604 interactions at the Technology Desk, and 762 in December. Help topics included: information about antivirus software, use snipping tool and print screenshot, navigating “identity verification” process, resizing photos, using Library of Things DVD player, resetting two-factor authentication prompt with a new phone, accessing Consumer Reports, troubleshooting iPass account, uploading scanned photos to Google Drive, digitizing 8mm film reel and more.
- In November 3,935 pages were scanned at the Scan Station, and December saw 4,531 scans.
- The TBS computer management system also allows for usage reports. November had 1,387 computer sessions (all locations) and December had 1,303.

- We deployed a laminator in the Technology Area in December, making this service available during all hours the library is open instead of the hours the Studio is open.



- Alejandro Barzallo ran the board meeting livestream in November.
- Digital & Maker Services Associate Ethan Herdrich updated and deployed updated Audacity instructions for the Digitization Station.
- DMS Manager Lauren Kelly trained on the Adult Services Desk in order to cover that service point during AS Department meetings.
- Lauren Kelly worked with YS Librarians Sarah Jo Zaharako and Lisa Bigelow on developing language for a welcome sign that promotes our library's culture of respect and presented it to the PIC group.
- Lydia Hanchett created a condensed guide to Technology Desk operations for staff in other departments who occasionally cover that service point during DMS meetings.

Library of Things

- Finn Dos Santos continues to work on processing new items for the Library of Things – November and December saw: Metal Detector, Giant Uno, Wingspan, GoPros, and 10 more puzzles. They have also consistently worked on upkeep and repairing items including: Karaoke Machine microphones, missing pieces for board games, documentation for the DVD player, and a BeeBot.
- Lydia Hanchett purchased a Knitting kit and a Crochet kit for Library of Things.

Communications and Events (Manager Sarah Beth Brown)

November/December Programming

November and December programming offered our community a rich mix of artistic performance, cultural exploration, and hands-on connection. Programming coordinator Jennifer Bartel put together a schedule of events that featured both scholarly and cultural speakers, and offered moments of connection for members of the community. Patrons continued to express appreciation for events that invite them to learn, reflect, and participate together.

November Program Highlights

Community Puzzle Exchange: We hosted our second Community Puzzle Exchange, an event that continues to grow in both donations and enthusiasm. Community members contributed more than 450 puzzles, and more than 150 patrons browsed and discovered new challenges to take home. The exchange also sparked moments of nostalgia—a patron was delighted to rediscover a long-discontinued childhood favorite puzzle and shared how meaningful it was to find it freely available at the library’s event.

Monet Lives! Actor and painter Jim Parks brought Claude Monet to life in a dynamic historical portrayal. The performance offered patrons an entertaining bridge between art history and theater. The program was enhanced by 70 tiny handmade replicas of Impressionist Era art painted by Parks that were used to illustrate the color and vitality of Impressionism.

History of the Jingle Dress In celebration of Native American Heritage Month, Ojibwa author Kim Sigafus presented the cultural history and significance of the Jingle Dress, appearing in her traditional regalia. With the help of a patron volunteer, she assembled her own Jingle Dress on a mannequin, offering attendees a close and respectful look at its craftsmanship.

Darshan: The Act of “Seeing” in Hindu Art (Virtual): A docent from the Asian Art Museum guided participants through depictions of Hindu deities Vishnu, Shiva, and several goddesses. The combination of visual depth and cultural context made the art more accessible for patrons.

Patron feedback included:

- “Excellent speaker.”
- “Zoom is very convenient for participation.”
- “This is the first time I’ve attended a Wilmette Public Library event. Such events are wonderful opportunities to learn and expand our knowledge of the world’s many cultural heritages.”

Additionally in November, Communications & Events manager Sarah Beth Brown worked with staff and the Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights to host a virtual program focusing on how immigrants can protect themselves in today’s political climate. This event was

very well attended with more than 100 participants, and showed a good deal of support from our community for our immigrant neighbors.

December Program Highlights

Bobby Lewis Jazz Trio – New Year’s Eve Concert: The library continued its popular tradition of welcoming the New Year with live jazz. Local favorites trumpeter Bobby Lewis, guitarist Andy Brown, and bassist Joe Policastro returned for an early New Year’s Eve concert, performing jazz standards and crowd favorites. This festive program once again drew community members together to celebrate the season through music.

Pages & Planning: A Year Ahead: This drop-in program invited patrons to prepare for 2026 by setting up planners, journals, and calendars, providing a calm, creative space for patrons to pause, look ahead, and begin the new year with intention.

Virtual Program Highlights

A Very Rockwell Holiday (Virtual): Art historian Jane Oneail explored the warmth and humor of winter through the festive artwork of Norman Rockwell. The program was very well received, with feedback survey comments such as:

- “Outstanding presentation by an especially articulate and knowledgeable presenter.”
- “Keep programs online so we can get diverse presenters from far away places.”

Jane Austen’s *Sanditon*: From Unfinished Swan Song to British Costume Drama (Virtual): In recognition of Jane Austen’s 250th birthday, author and Anglophile Claire Evans examined Austen’s final, unfinished work, *Sanditon*. This program offered literary context, historical insight, and popular culture appeal for both Austen enthusiasts and general audiences.

November/December Communications

Our Winter newsletter was mailed to homes the last week of December. This issue covers January-March, and features information supporting our children’s Winter Reading Club and adult and teen Wilmette Reads, a spotlight on our first floor collection revitalization project, and event listings and service promotions for all ages. As a 16-page issue, this required a particularly high level of effort and planning. We were lucky to have an early snow and get a great shot for the cover, which is always exciting, as we want the main image to be eye catching and seasonal.

Feeding into the newsletter, but also with building wide impact, was our focus on graphics and promotions for Wilmette Reads and Winter Reading Club. This year's Wilmette Reads features a bold color palette and unique visual style that we hope grabs patron attention. We are also thrilled to introduce all new giveaways for this year, including a new enamel badge for all participants, and a embroidered baseball cap and printed fanny pack as a finisher prize. As Adult Services continues to tweak the format of this reading series, the communications team has a lot of fun coming up with new designs and ideas for this signature series. Graphic designer Sarah Rose does an enormous amount of design work for this series and consistently turns out exciting, eye-catching ideas that are always on brand. She created and produced many items including the activity log & readers guide, branded posters & flyers, a full bulletin board display, branded companion sheet for The Studio, shelf talkers, themed signage, bookmark templates, and a giant banner for the AS desk—the largest item that we have ever printed in house!



In addition to these major projects, the communications team worked on improving and updating internal processes in November and December. While our team does have many independent projects, we also do a lot of behind-the-scenes work for initiatives from other departments, and we put a lot of effort at the end of the year into improving these workflows.

In addition to the above projects, Sarah had a busy couple of months in graphic design:

- Worked with Andrea and Sarah Beth to select and order a small, branded pouch for new youth card holders, they should be arriving shortly after a slight delay in stock.
- Designed, printed, updated and/or replenished a number of printed materials including the signage for the temporary heating issue.
- Created a sheet of fun and branded stickers as a handout for patrons at Jennifer Bartel's Pages & Planning program.
- Worked with Matthew to select and design an updated tote bag that is sold to patrons at Circulation
- Created new posters for display in the vestibule and the bulletin board, with accompanying digital images as needed, including a new welcome poster for the vestibule
- Provided graphics, files, and design consulting as needed, including finding images for use in Communico, and an updated financial infographic.
- Created new signs and updated old ones as needed as spaces shift on the lower level, this will be an ongoing and developing project as the spaces continue to evolve.
- Created signage and graphics for various informational needs such as holiday closures

- Produced, printed, updated and/or replenished a number of printed materials including the virtual branch flyer.
- Designed and ordered branded tags for Library of Things items, an upgrade to how we label these varied items.
- Worked with Christine to troubleshoot and maintain the large format printer.
- Produced program signage throughout the building, including a large poster for the *K-Pop Demon Hunters* program.
- Designed materials for distribution throughout the community, such as a handout flyer for the Kids' Book Pick service.

- Sent weekly general newsletters, biweekly Youth Services newsletters, a RA email in collaboration with Rachel Rothe on 12/11, a Winter Reading kick-off email on 12/15, and a 2025: Year in Review email in collaboration with Sarah Beth on 12/31
- Updated the Winter Reading Club and Wilmette Reads webpages, created a website header and slides for WRC, and encouraged participation via features in the newsletters and on social media




Information Technology (Manager Michael Pocrnich)

The final phase of the implementation of our recently upgraded computing hardware and software was completed in November when all public and staff PCs were migrated to the Windows 11 operating system. The library's fleet of 12 classroom laptops were updated in December, as were the 5 digital signage displays on the first floor.

The library's internet service provider experienced an outage on November 6, which knocked out 16 area businesses and residential areas. Recognizing the outage may affect operations for an extended period, IT deployed mobile beacon hotspots and various wireless devices to public service desks to help maintain services. As a result, staff were able to provide reasonably consistent service from the Adult and Youth desks, and Circulation was able to perform all of its regular services as well. The self-checkout stations continued to operate as normal in their fail-over "downtime" state, and that data was able to be uploaded to CCS when internet service was restored after 10:30pm that same day.

IT Assistant Christine Hightower is revising our AV setup instructions to include new changes to the auditorium setup protocols. She is also preparing to give staff a refresher on the auditorium and small meeting room technology equipment, which will be scheduled sometime in early 2026. Christine also worked with Technical Services, Adult Services, and Youth Services to design a universal book ordering template for staff to use when requesting items to order (following the dissolution of Baker & Taylor and our prior procedures thus requiring a workaround). She also made a PowerPoint presentation to train the staff involved in the new ordering process.

Facilities and Safety (Manager Marcos Levy)

Grounds

Our native plantings have taken a toll from the extreme heat and drought periods. I asked Chalet (our landscape maintenance contractor) for suggestions, and they presented several plants that would be favorable to our environment. Though it was late in the season most of the plants were available. They kept coming in groups, so instead of just waiting for them all, Chalet completed the installation in three separate trips. They were relatively root bound upon installation, so we will see them flourish next spring. These plants are out of harm's way during the winter.

This fall and winter, Chalet will connect with one of their designers and will create something for the large south front wall along with making adjustments to the other areas that were proposed, recommending removal of the hydrangeas and coming up with substitutions.

HVAC

The VRF (variable refrigerant flow) system, which services the heating, ventilation, and air conditioning for front/west-most portions of the first and second floors, experienced a critical failure in late 2025 due to a variety of factors. This ultimately left these areas cooler than normal for the season, and the associated thermostats couldn't keep up. The system was repaired and restored in mid-January.

Building Improvement

In December, the auditorium bottle filling station and its fountain's internal piping leaked and flooded the floor. We're replacing it with a new, updated ADA-accessible filtered fountain and filling station. The plumbing must be moved to comply with code, and the wall will have to be repaired and painted before the new unit is installed. We agreed that this is also an opportunity to refresh this restroom area with additional lighting and new paint for the lobby.



Also in December, it was discovered that a roof drainpipe in the fiction room has a hole at the seam of a joint which leaks onto the carpet outside of the pillar during heavy rainfall. Hill Mechanical's plumbing team investigated and found the source of the leak. To repair it, we needed to open the wall in order to replace a 6 ft section of cast iron pipe and the joint that protrudes through the outside wall. The difficulty is the hub portion in the wall is sealed with concrete, limiting access for repair and replacement. Hill is going to try to remove the piece without disturbing the exterior face brick. They temporarily sealed the hole to prevent any additional water seepage and to adequately prepare for the logistics and equipment to fix the problem. We expect the repairs to be completed in late January.

Personnel Updates

Adult Services

We have hired David Whittingham as our new part-time Adult Services Librarian. David brings more than 25 years of experience in the library field, the majority of which he spent at the Des Plaines Public Library. During his time there, he served as a Reader's Services Assistant and later as Reader's Services Manager for seven years. In that role, David oversaw the Fiction, AV, and Teen departments, managed outreach services for homebound patrons, and developed collections in adult fiction, audiobooks, and music. He was also selected to author a local history book in collaboration with the Des Plaines Public Library and its local history museum. David's first day will be February 2, 2026.

Part-time Adult Services Librarian Rachel Rothe will be transitioning into a full-time role as Advisory Librarian. In this newly created specialty position, Rachel will focus on expanding advisory services, including private book club support, display coordination, reading programs, and discussion facilitation. She will partner with Adult Services Assistant Manager Rachel Garcia to develop advisory resources and support skill development for the team. Rachel will begin her new position on January 19, 2026.

Technical Services

After two rounds of interviews including Director Anthony Auston, HR Manager Michael Boone and the whole Technical Services team, we are excited to announce that we have hired Sarah DeHaan as our new Technical Services Manager. Sarah brings a wealth of library and cataloging experience, having held positions at Baker & Taylor, World Book Inc., and River Forest Public Library. She also completed postgraduate cataloging work as a librarian-in-residence for the Library of Congress. Sarah holds a Masters in Library and Information Science from the University of Illinois, and a Bachelor in Communications from Lake Forest College. Currently, Sarah works at the reference desk at the Bourbonnais Public Library, where her passion for public library service has been reignited. Sarah's first day will be Monday, February 9, 2026.

2025 Calendar Year Turnover Rate

Staff turnover rate for calendar year 2025 was 9%. This is a slight increase from the 6% turnover rate we experienced at the end of calendar year 2024. During 2025, we had 8 staff members leave their employment, including the following reasons: 2 retirements, 2 family obligations, and 2 employees who found newly created opportunities at other libraries that we were unable to offer.

Special projects

2026 Open Enrollment

2026 Open Enrollment for benefits-eligible staff ran from November 3 through November 14. On 11/3, HR Manager Michael Boone and Finance Manager Sandra Discepolo held a benefits meeting for staff to go over changes to the healthcare plan, premiums, and in particular, the Health Reimbursement Account. As reported earlier in the year, renewal rates increased to record-level highs, and as a result, premiums increased, and coverage levels decreased, including the elimination of prescription weight-loss medications.

4th Quarter Staff Anniversary Celebration

We celebrated the years of service of staff who were hired in the 4th Quarter on December 18. Staff enjoyed cake and an assortment of treats courtesy of Costco and the Hospitality Team to celebrate staff's dedication, hard work and accomplishments.

Employment Law Conference

On November 13, HR Manager Michael Boone attended the annual Employment Law Conference sponsored by HR Source in Naperville. The daylong event featured topics ranging from hiring practices and incident investigations to leave compliance and politics at work. The keynote speaker, legal expert Mike Cramer from Ogletree Deakins, focused on employers and the new administration specifically centering on ensuring that your DEI initiatives are not considered discriminatory under our new administration's parameters. We also received information on new and existing policies that will need to be updated in our HR Policy manual, such as NICU-related leave, Organ and Blood Donation leave, and Nursing Mothers Act.



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From Circulation

I want to thank you and the rest of the interlibrary loan staff for all your help in collecting so many children's picture books published over the past year. As you may know, George Sullivan and I will again be coordinating an Osher Lifelong Learning Institute class in January that focuses on important books in the picture book genre that we believe to be strong candidates for the annual ALA youth media awards. Having access to so many wonderful books through the Interlibrary Loan system has been such a blessing...so thank you.

From Digital & Maker Services

Ethan Herdrich had a 1:1 technology appointment helping a patron with very little digital literacy learn how to use a computer. He showed the patron how to use a mouse, how to open a web browser and search on Google, practicing by navigating the library website. We also found some free typing lessons online when the patron recognized that his method of hunting and pecking at the keyboard was not sufficient. It was a lot of information for the patron to process but he seemed very motivated to figure it out.

In November a 25-year patron of the library stopped by to say that, on a scale of 1-5, the library is a 6.3! He said that the people at the Technology Desk are always helpful, so much so that today he was able to come in and do what he needed to do on his own, according to Beth. Digital Services Assistant Annie Blackie assisted a patron at the Tech Desk who was trying to apply for a job on Indeed and getting very emotional because she couldn't figure out how to find and attach her resume. Annie helped her find the document on her phone and access it on the computer through her Google account. She was very appreciative and talked about how everyone at the Tech Desk is so helpful every time she comes in.

Finn Dos Santos assisted a patron who printed 100 zines about ICE response and using whistles to alert bystanders.

Lydia Hanchett helped a visually impaired patron move PDF files from discs to a USB drive on 12/3. She was not a comfortable computer user but was a very good sport about it, and she was shocked and effusive to learn at the end of our interaction that we wouldn't charge for the help (just the USB she'd bought at Circulation).

Lydia also helped a patron print out an Amazon shipping label on 12/3 and she was so pleased that she requested a comment card to write nice things on. She had arrived frustrated and prepared to have a bad time, but we were able to get her label printed with minimal trouble.

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From Youth Services

A patron approached the desk one busy weekday to ask, "How often do you have this many families here?" When I told her with a smile, "Every day, especially in cold weather." She replied, "It's wonderful that the library provides this space for them."

Our scavenger hunts are inspiring patrons at home, too. A caregiver told us that she loves to take home the sheets for the kids' play dates. She cuts up an extra sheet and tapes the shapes around the house. Then the kids search the house for them!

One librarian shared, “On my way out yesterday, a caregiver told me that the family she cares for had just moved to Wilmette and that yesterday was her first library visit. SHE LOVED IT! She said how wonderful it is here!”

Fund Libraries

Fully fund Fiscal Year 2026 state appropriations for the Illinois Secretary of State's grant programs, equalization grants, and per capita grants for public libraries, school libraries, and library systems. Approve appropriations for the Illinois State Library and higher education institutions including state university and community college academic libraries for the benefit of students, their families, and our communities. Increase the per capita and per student grant rates for public libraries and school libraries, respectively, to keep pace with increased expenses libraries will incur throughout the year.

Library System Area & Per Capita Grants/Public Per Capita & School District Grants Inflationary Adjustments

PPC received a proposal to adjust library and related grants to account for inflationary economic conditions. As noted in the proposal, "without an inflation adjustment, these vital funding mechanisms lose value over time, impacting library operations and services." Grants in these areas have been held flat for the past five fiscal years; we seek appropriate adjustment of grant line funding amounts.



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Require Public Library Trustee Training

The legislative proposal submitted requires public library trustees to undergo training each year. The PPC found this to be a smart, proactive step for a representative of local government to be best prepared as a trustee. It would set a shared understanding of the role of a public library trustee.

Open Educational Resources Funding Grant

CARLI's Open Educational Resources (OER) Committee presented its proposal for funding OER to address rising textbook costs that are creating an equity gap in higher education. PPC supports the \$3 million proposal to support faculty in creating OER materials. CARLI received a \$2 million US Department of Education Open Textbooks Pilot Grant, 2021-26; and a \$300,000 grant to administer the FY24 \$3 million Secretary of State/Illinois State Library grant. By the Spring 2026 semester, 219 classes have used or will be using the no-cost learning materials created by the two grants. Impact data is still being gathered. The OER funding would be part of the Secretary of State budget, a recurring \$3 million grant, and would be available to all schools in higher education per ILLINET.

Making eBooks Equitable & Accessible

The cost of eBooks to Illinois libraries is an ongoing and growing concern as libraries respond to user demand. PPC recommends taking legislative action to help libraries address the cost and limited terms of e-content.

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RECENT LEGISLATION

- **License to Read Act** provides that the State Librarian may negotiate with publishers of eBooks and audiobooks on behalf of libraries.
- **Banning Book Bans** requires libraries to adhere to the ALA's Library Bill of Rights and to create written policies against the practice of banning books in order to qualify for state grants.
- **Media Literacy** requires every public high school to include in its curriculum a unit of instruction on media literacy; sets forth what topics the unit of instruction shall include.

STUDENTS SUCCEED WITH LICENSED LIBRARIANS

In Illinois, the majority of elementary and high schools with a physical library are not staffed by those who have earned library certification from an accredited academic institution. There are no other roles in Illinois schools where unlicensed educators teach students.

Dozens of studies across the country indicate having a licensed librarian correlates with higher test scores across the board, even when variables like demographics and economic status are taken into account. One of the easiest steps Illinois can take for student success is to require all schools to employ ISBE licensed librarians, a mandate which is currently in place but inconsistently enforced ([23ILAC1.420\(o\)\(4\)](#)).

THE SLATE PROJECT

In response to large gaps in the data representing Illinois school libraries discovered by the [SLIDE Project](#), RAILS launched the School Library Data Project in January 2022 and created the [SLATE data dashboard \(School Library Advocacy Through Education\)](#). This dashboard allows users to look at individual schools or districts and find statistics about their library programs, including the collection size, dollars spent, and number of licensed librarians employed. Federal Funding for Libraries in Illinois: IMLS/LSTA

Administered through the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA), the only federal program that exclusively covers services and funding for libraries, provided \$5.7 million for Illinois Libraries in FY2024 under the Grants to States Program. **Please support LSTA funding in the FY2025 federal budget; over 11.8 million Illinoisans reside in public library service areas which benefit from this funding.**

In FY2024 this funding impacted Illinois libraries through:

Efficiently Sharing Resources: 11 million items were transferred among more than 1,700 public, school, academic, and special libraries in Illinois. LSTA-supported resource sharing allowed for ground delivery services provided by the regional library systems and at no-charge to Illinois residents who requested the library materials. No one library can own everything; and sharing resources between libraries benefits library users across the entire state.

Additionally, through subscriptions for WorldCat Discovery/FirstSearch services Illinois libraries conducted nearly 1 million citation searches between July 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024 to serve their library patrons and support their library operations. Academic and college libraries constituted (263,379) 28% of searches; public libraries (65%) 610,099; K-12 school libraries (5%) 47,157 and special libraries such as medical, law, corporate, and government (2%) 17,254. Use of these services allows libraries to identify and access the resources that are required to meet the expectations of their patrons.

Project Next Generation Grants: This initiative is designed to educate at-risk students and bridge the digital divide. Public libraries work closely with their school districts to identify needs; since its 2000 inception, thousands of teens benefited. In FY2024, 30 libraries received more than \$500,000 in funding to enhance students' abilities to deal with life experiences, develop critical thinking skills, and prepare for the future. The program is designed to immerse students in learning while providing access to computers, software, and technologies. The Peoria Public Library received \$12,500 to implement "Project Next Generation Mini Stem Activities" at its Lincoln Branch. Other communities benefitting from this program included Normal, Highwood, Chicago Ridge, Carbondale, Evanston and Glen Carbon.

Public Library Programming: Administered by the Northbrook Public Library, the "Illinois Libraries Present" initiative allows over 200 public libraries to afford high quality online programming for their patrons that would be cost prohibitive for single libraries to hold on their own. The program affords public libraries access to nationally known speakers and authors at no cost to the public they serve.

Professional Development: The Illinois Library Association receives funding from the Illinois State Library and partners with the Reaching Across Illinois and the Illinois Heartland library systems to provide library leadership training for library directors, those who are brand new or those newer to the position, via "Directors' University." These programs enable library leaders to make the most out of local tax dollars which support the bulk of public library operations in this state.

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Why can't my library buy more e-books and audiobooks?

e-book and digital audiobook costs are too high for libraries, and access is limited.

It's unsustainable for libraries to continue to purchase digital content this way.

Publishers put limits on library e-books & e-audiobooks



Print books are owned by the library and can be used for decades until they're worn out.

e-Books and digital audiobooks are licensed—libraries don't own them.

Plus, publishers put limits on how long the content can be used:



1 or 2 years

26 or 52 checkouts

Once that limit is reached, libraries need to re-purchase the license at the same inflated price if they want to keep offering it to their community.







Open Educational Resources (OER) Legislative Proposal 2026

Open Educational Resources (OER) are teaching, learning, and research materials (like textbooks) that are either in the public domain or licensed in a manner that provides everyone with free and perpetual permission to engage in the 5Rs: retaining, remixing, revising, reusing, and redistributing. The material is free online, affordable in print, and can be saved for future use and study.

CARLI and its supporters request permanent funding for Open Educational Resources in the amount of an annual \$3 million appropriation to the Secretary of State's budget.

Background & context



The cost of course materials has become an equity issue because students do not have equal access to courses if they are unable to afford textbooks. According to the "[National Course Materials Survey 2023](#)," more than half of college students have taken fewer courses or avoided registering for a specific course due to the cost of course materials, including textbooks.

Why is it important to provide students with no-cost learning materials?



CARLI's "[Illinois Course Materials: Student Perspective Survey](#)," administered to Illinois higher education students in 2023, details that many students are making difficult choices between purchasing textbooks or purchasing other necessities, such as food, housing, or medication. Other comments suggested that students are experiencing significant stress due to their financial situation, and the cost of course materials adds to the stress. Members of the Illinois General Assembly have expressed strong support for reducing the cost of textbooks and other course materials. Similarly, faculty and instructors are intensely interested in promoting OER as they see firsthand the impact of textbook costs on their students.

Comprehensive solution

Open Education Resources, or OER, is a critical part of the solution for reducing the cost of higher education for Illinois students. Adopting a statewide OER initiative does not exclude other programs to reduce the cost of course materials, such as inclusive access or institutional textbook rental programs, would be abandoned. These options could be integrated to provide comprehensive coverage. ***OER availability is good for ALL students in Illinois*** because OER created are available at no cost for adaptation and reuse by anyone. Sharing knowledge widely is an important piece of the academic mission.

OER benefits



OER provide a number of benefits as part of a comprehensive solution to reduce the cost of course materials.

- The cost of OER to students is minimal to zero.
- Many forms of OER can be modified and therefore customized to a course.
- OER can be easily updated to remain relevant and do not require long lead times for publishing.
- OER can be accessed by students anywhere, at anytime.

Is this an adjustment to an existing statute, or is it new legislation?



Rep. Norma Hernandez introduced HB3411 in February 2025 for inclusion in the FY26 Secretary of State's budget. The bill was ultimately not successful. The state's academic library supporters filed 119 witness slips in support of the bill.

SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

Appropriates \$3,000,000 from the General Revenue Fund to the Secretary of State for a recurring, permanent grant program for Illinois academic libraries. These grants shall be applied toward Open Education Resources.

The Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE) in the U.S. Department of Education awarded a \$2 million grant to the University of Illinois System/CARLI for “[Illinois SCOERs: Support for Creation of Open Educational Resources.](#)”



Illinois OER: Open Educational Resources Grants, 2025-2026

The \$3 million program, “Illinois Fund for Open Educational Resource Creation,” was included in the Secretary of State’s FY24 budget. The Illinois State Library awarded \$300,000 to CARLI to support programmatic administration.

Success of OER funding in Illinois

Students enrolled in Illinois SCOERs-supported courses demonstrated success through **high pass rates, high overall course scores, low withdrawal, drop, and fail rates.** This success was supported by their self-reported perceptions of high performance and attribution to open educational resources. Based on preliminary data collection, 68% of students surveyed noticed a difference in their subject area mastery while using OER created with grant funds, and 70% of students noted their study habits changed while using the OER.

Why anchor the program at the Illinois State Library with CARLI support?

Library grant programs have been successfully administered for decades through the Office of the Illinois Secretary of State. The partnership between CARLI and the State Library has been very positive. CARLI is the manager for several grant programs from the Illinois State Library, including the Illinois Library Delivery Service and the Digital Public Library of America. CARLI is a centralized organization that is supported by the University of Illinois System and 124 institutions of higher education, about 90 percent of the not-for-profit institutions in Illinois. CARLI’s experience and established conduits to higher education point to CARLI as an administrative agent for the program.

Unique opportunity

Academic libraries are uniquely positioned to support and promote the use of OER. They understand the unique curricula of each institution, they have a physical presence on campus, they have relationships with faculty across disciplines and across the institutions, and they provide access to scholarly materials. They represent a community already in place that can provide scholarly infrastructure for a statewide OER initiative. Many libraries are already training faculty in the use and creation of OER. CARLI membership includes almost all the higher education institution libraries across the state, serving more than 90% of Illinois higher education students, and has long standing relationships with the Illinois State Library and the Office of the Secretary of State. In addition, CARLI already has a successful track record of supporting collaborative efforts among the state’s libraries.


What is CARLI?
